

# Death and the Christian

A Booklet To Guide You Through Funeral Planning

The heart of the Gospel of Jesus Christ and His Church is life! He has promised that those who believe in Him have life, now and forever. In Christ Jesus, there is hope now and beyond the grave. We believe that as we have been baptized into Christ's death, so also, having passed through the gate of death, at the resurrection we shall be raised to new life in Christ (Romans 6.1-8).

Because a Christian believes in God's powerful victory over death, the funeral service can be a thankful and hopeful service. The service is not intended to be a surrender to hopeless grief, nor to mere sentiment. It is above all a witness to faith in our crucified and risen Savior, Jesus Christ.

### As you plan for the funeral:

- 1. Please discuss the death, the funeral, and your wishes or questions with your pastor and the funeral director as soon as possible following the death. It is important for these persons to coordinate any plans that are made.
- 2. Remember that a Christian funeral is a worship service, and its purpose is to glorify God and to proclaim the life-giving Gospel of Jesus Christ. Preparations are therefore made from the perspective of the Christian faith. The purpose of the service is not to glorify a body or the memory of a person, nor is it a time for a showy display of sentimentality.
- 3. The funeral service of an active member is normally held in the church where that person was nourished by God's word and sacraments. If the deceased was not a member of this congregation, the funeral could be held at the church or elsewhere, depending upon a family's preference.
- 4. The order for worship will follow the rite, "Funeral," in the Evangelical Lutheran Worship (ELW) hymnal or the most current supplemental Funeral Rite resources approved and endorsed by the ELCA and Augsburg Fortress Publishers.
- 5. The singing of hymns by the congregation is strongly recommended, both as a statement of faith and as a means of participation by the congregation. Other music, whether sung or played by soloists or instrumentalists should receive prior approval by the pastor of this congregation. A list of hymns—from the ELW—can be found in this booklet.
- 6. It is recommended that the family consider and suggest appropriate Bible lessons or verses for reading at the service. Normally two lessons are read.

- 7. Anyone from the family wanting to speak publicly at the funeral worship service is invited to do so prior to the reading of scripture. Please provide the pastor with a transcript of the family's remarks prior to the worship service, and keep in mind that a short period of remembrance during worship should total no more than 10-15 cumulative minutes. A microphone can be provided in the fellowship hall during the luncheon for other memories to be shared if so requested.
- 8. Cut flowers, arranged and displayed tastefully, can bring dignity and beauty to the service. At the same time, or perhaps in lieu of flowers, the family might suggest memorials for charitable purposes, including this or another congregation, service organizations, research groups, etc.
- 9. A Christian funeral is a worship service; therefore, rituals of non-church related organizations are not permitted in the service, nor is the funeral to be a time for display or recognition of any organization. A time for brief recognition of the deceased's service in such a group (in the armed forces, for example) can be provided as a part of the committal service at the cemetery.
- 10. During the funeral worship service, the casket or urn may be draped in a pall, a sign of being clothed with Christ in Baptism. The pall is a visual linking our lives, baptism, and the promise of Christ pointing toward life eternal in the forgiveness of our sins. Pastor will ask you to consider this.
- 11. If a luncheon is desired after the funeral and burial, the parish's Women of the ELCA (WELCA) will help to coordinate the meal. Two options are available. First, the family can choose to have WELCA take care of the entire meal (the only cost being that of the main course). Or, the family can choose to cater the meal through a private caterer at their own cost. If a private caterer is used, WELCA will still be glad to help serve. Arrangements can be made through the parish secretary.
